#### MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TRINITY RIVER VISION AUTHORITY ("TRVA") HELD ON THE 5th DAY OF OCTOBER, 2016 AT 2:00 PM

The call of the roll disclosed the presence of the Directors as follows:

#### Present

Also in attendance were: JD Granger, Sandy Newby, Shanna Cate, Woody Frossard, Matt Oliver, Kelly Halcom, Jeni Bell, and Jenna Brummett of TRVA; Alan Thomas, Dan Buhman, Jennifer Mitchell, Kathleen Miller, Rachel Navejar, and Chad Lowrance of the Tarrant Regional Water District; Doug Rademaker, Katherine Beck, and Laura Voltmann of the City of Fort Worth; Lee Christie and Ethel Steele of Pope, Hardwicke, Christie, Schell, Kelly & Taplett, L.L.P.; Bill Paxton of Trinity River Communications—Joint Venture; Gail Hicks of the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE); and Marty Leonard.

#### I. Call to Order

President Maenius convened the meeting at 2:07 P.M. with the assurance that a quorum was present and all requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act had been met.

#### II. Public Comment

No public comment.

#### III. Action Items

A1.

On a motion made by Director Oliver and seconded by Director Henderson, the Directors unanimously voted to approve the minutes of the meeting held on September 7, 2016, as corrected to reflect the presence of Director Henderson at the meeting.

With the recommendation of Sandy Newby (TRVA, Chief Financial Officer), Director Henderson made a motion to receive and file the TRVA Finance Report. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous. The TRVA Finance Report is attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

#### A3.

With the recommendation of Ms. Newby, Director Riley made a motion to receive and file the TRV Central City Finance Report. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous. The TRV Central City Finance Report is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit "B"</u>.

#### A4.

With the recommendation of Shanna Cate (TRVA, Programming and Development Manager), this item was tabled.

#### A5.

With the recommendation of Woody Frossard (TRVA, Project Manager), Director Riley made a motion to approve payment of remaining contract amount, including release of retainage, to Hulcher Professional Services in the amount of \$309,776.87, and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents, for remediation of contaminated soil related to the Partial Response Action Plan Implementation for McKinley Ironworks/Airco, UPRR Spur, and MMM/APAC Pit (TRVA Project CSP 15-097). The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous.

#### A6.

With the recommendation of Jenna Brummett (TRVA, Assistant Project Manager),
Director Henderson made a motion to recommend authorizing staff to exercise Option Year 4 in
the Environmental Engineering Services Contract with CB&I (formerly Shaw Environmental and

Infrastructure Group, Inc.) in the amount of \$950,000 and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous.

A7.

With the recommendation of Ms. Brummett, Director Oliver made a motion to recommend authorizing staff to exercise Option Year 3 in the Environmental Engineering, Procurement and Remediation Contract with CDM Smith, Inc. in the amount of \$1,535,000 and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Riley and the vote in favor was unanimous.

A8.

With the recommendation of Ms. Brummett, Director Henderson made a motion to approve a contract with Construction Companies Group, LLC for demolition and salvage of the StarRFoam metal building, TRVA Project Number CSP 16-123, in the amount of zero dollars and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous.

#### V. Discussion Items

D1.

TRVA News, Events and Development

1.

Shanna Cate (TRVA, Programming and Development Manager) reported to the Board on recent *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* articles discussing the Water Resources Development Act, which will provide funding for the Trinity River Vision Project. She also noted a recent *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* article highlighting the move of Texas Refinery Corp. from Fort Worth to Mansfield. In addition, Ms. Cate reported that Panther Island will be a featured project at the Urban Land Institute Fall Meeting in Dallas October 24-27. Last, Ms. Cate reported that prominent

architect Bing Thom, who was instrumental in the development of the Trinity Uptown (Panther Island) plan, passed away yesterday.

J.D. Granger (TRVA, Executive Director) provided an update to the Board on the Panther Island Development Committee. Mr. Granger reported the Encore multi-family project is in the final stages for approval and will proceed to the design committee and Urban Design Commission for approval. He also previewed for the Board artist's renderings of the project and its components. The project, as yet unnamed, will consist of 301 units. Lastly, he reported that design should be complete in the Spring of 2017 with construction commencing in the Summer of 2017 and an anticipated completion time of 18-21 months.

Matt Oliver (TRVA, Public Information Officer) next provided an update on Gateway Park. Mr. Oliver showed the Board photographs of the two new Texas Parks and Wildlife Department walkways. He reported to the Board that the walkways were dedicated August 27 and the dedication included a ribbon cutting and a 5K as part of the Gateway Trail unveiling. Mr. Oliver also showed the Board photographs of the new signage by Fort Woof and new signage which highlights future planned amenities in the Park.

D2.

Update on Panther Island/Central City Project

1.

Mr. Frossard gave an update on the Panther Island/Central City Project. Mr. Frossard reported that the partial response action plan implementation authorized at the September 7 Board meeting for McKinley Ironworks, UPRR Spur and Texas Refinery is underway. Mr. Frossard also reported that work for the demolition and asbestos abatement of Coburn Catering Warehouse and 217 Partners properties, also authorized at the September 7 Board meeting, will commence

next week and should be completed in 30 days. Lastly, he reported that the Luminant acquisition was completed and will make approximately 35 acres of property available for public use.

2.

On behalf of the City of Fort Worth (COFW), Doug Rademaker, P.E. (COFW, TRV Project Manager) provided an update on the Henderson Street and White Settlement Road Bridges. Mr. Rademaker reported that the touchdown point for the Henderson Street Bridge is progressing and the wall systems should be completed by the end of the month. He also reported that the wall panels are going up for the White Settlement Road Bridge. He explained the testing process of the mock-up of the V-pier, reporting that the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) used ground penetrating radar to look for voids in the piers and he provided the Board photographs of the testing. Mr. Rademaker reported that the V-pier contractor had to replace a subcontractor and an updated schedule will be forthcoming. Once the schedule is finalized the subcontractor will move forward with pouring the V-piers.

Katherine Beck (COFW, TRV Project Manager) provided an update to the Board on financial issues associated with the bridges. She reported that there are three new change orders and TxDOT approved, in error, one of the change orders but, because it was approved in error it has not been determined who is responsible for payment. She also reported to the Board that the meeting between TxDOT and the COFW has been delayed because the team is still waiting on the contractor to test the mock-up. Lastly, she reported on the financials associated with the approved and unapproved change orders, noting the final result that TRVA could potentially be responsible for \$1.3 million of the costs. She confirmed there is money in a contingency fund to cover some or all of this expense.

D3.

#### Update on TRV-Gateway Park Master Plan

Gail Hicks (USACE) provided an update on the Gateway Park Master Plan. She reported that dirt work is progressing at the Oxbow A and C sites and approximately 1.27 million cubic yards of dirt has been removed. She also reported that work has started on the outfalls for Site E. Ms. Hicks advised the Board that dirt hauling for Riverside Park will commence the first week of November. Also, she noted that the contract for the Ham Branch levee work was awarded. Lastly, she noted that the design kick-off meeting for the North Channel and Oxbow sites is scheduled for September 20 and all congressional requirements for funding have been met.

D4.

Update on Citywide Recreation TRV Master Plan

1.

Rachel Navejar, (TRWD, Neighborhood and Recreational Enhancement Coordinator) reported to the Board that the annual Streams and Valleys Friends of the River – Party on the Plaza will be October 20.

D5.

The next TRVA Board of Directors meeting is scheduled for November 2 at 2:00 pm.

#### V. Executive Session

President Maenius next called an executive session at 3:31 P.M. under Section 551.072 of the Texas Government Code to deliberate the purchase or value of real property and under Section 551.071 of the Texas Government Code to conduct a private consultation with attorneys regarding pending or contemplated litigation and to consult with legal counsel on a matter in which the duty of counsel under the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct clearly conflicts with

Chapter 551, Texas Government Code. The executive session concluded, and President Meanius reconvened the regular session at 4:14 P.M., noting that a quorum was present.

There being no further business before the Board of Directors, the meeting was adjourned at 4:14 P.M.
