MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TRINITY RIVER VISION AUTHORITY ("TRVA") HELD ON THE 6th DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 2017 AT 2:00 PM

The call of the roll disclosed the presence of the Directors as follows:

Florance and Ethel Steele of Pope, Hardwicke, Christie, Schell, Kelly & Taplett, L.L.P.; John Schultz of Trinity River Communications-Joint Venture; Gail Hicks of the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE); Christine Jacoby of Freese and Nichols Inc.; and Marty Leonard.

I. Call to Order

President Maenius convened the meeting at 2:07 P.M. with the assurance that a quorum was present and all requirements of the Texas Open Meetings Act had been met.

II. Public Comment

No public comment.

III. Action Items

A1.

On a motion made by Director Oliver, the Directors voted to approve the minutes of the meeting held on August 2, 2017. Director Henderson seconded the motion and the vote in favor passed. Director Riley abstained.

A2.

With the recommendation of Sandy Newby (TRVA, Chief Financial Officer), Director Henderson made a motion to receive and file the TRVA Finance Report. The motion was seconded by Director Riley and the vote in favor was unanimous. The TRVA Finance Report is attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

A3.

With the recommendation of Ms. Newby, Director Espino made a motion to receive and file the TRV Central City Finance Report. The motion was seconded by Director Henderson and the vote in favor was unanimous. The TRV Central City Finance Report is attached hereto as Exhibit "B".

A4.

With the recommendation of Jenna Brummett, TRVA, Asst. Project Manager, Director Riley made a motion to approve a contract with Garrett Demolition, Inc. for demolition and asbestos abatement of the Radioshack property, TRVA Project Number CSP 17-104, in the amount of \$224,198 and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous.

A5.

With the recommendation of Ms. Brummett, Director Oliver made a motion to approve a not-to-exceed authorization to pay Republic Waste the amount of \$75,000 for waste disposal

services related to the demolition and asbestos abatement of former Radioshack property. The motion was seconded by Director Henderson and the vote in favor was unanimous.

A6.

With the recommendation of Ms. Brummett, Director Henderson made a motion to extend the current option year in the Professional Services Agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for Phase II of the Panther Island Master Plan and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Oliver and the vote in favor was unanimous.

A7.

With the recommendation of Ms. Brummett, Director Oliver made a motion to authorize staff to exercise the next option year and the addition of five more option years in the Program Controls, Scheduling & Cost Support Services contract with Innovative Management Solutions, Inc. in the amount of \$747,500 and to authorize Woody Frossard to sign the contract documents. The motion was seconded by Director Brooks and the vote in favor was unanimous.

V. Discussion Items

D1.

TRVA News, Events and Development

1.

Shanna Cate (TRVA, Programming and Development Manager) provided to the Board an update of Rockin' the River 2017. She reported that the new all day format broadened the audience and the event experienced fewer weather impacts. She also reported Rockin' the River was featured on the Travel Channel, in Channel 11 and Channel 5 segments, and in ads in *Texas Monthly* placed by the Fort Worth Convention and Visitors Bureau. Ms. Cate highlighted the sponsors and showed a video recap of the event. Next, Ms. Cate noted that TRVA hosted the SteerFW After Hours Mixer and the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce After Hours Mixer in the

education center with approximately 50 attendees at each event. She also reported to the Board on articles in *FortWorthBusiness.com*, "Work on Henderson Street, White Settlement Bridges Progressing; New Traffic Pattern"; *Star-Telegram.com*, "Part of Fort Worth's Main Street Closes As Work Revs Up On Panther Island Bridges"; and *Star-Telegram.com*, "Play Ball? There's A New Plan To Bring Baseball Back To LaGrave Field".

Next, Ms. Cate provided a Panther Island Development Committee (the "Committee") update to the Board. Ms. Cate reported that the full set of design plans for the Encore development at 4th and Main Street were reviewed and approved by the committee at the August meeting pending minor modifications that will be sent back and approved at a staff level. She also advised the Board that the Committee recommended street lighting for the Panther Island District including the Trinity River promenade. The light fixtures will be reviewed by the bypass channel and promenade design team before final selection is made.

D2.

Update on Panther Island/Central City Project

1.

Mr. Woody Frossard (TRVA, Project Manager), gave an update on the Panther Island/Central City Project. He advised the Board that the McKinley environmental remediation work is complete, has been seeded and lacks only a suitable stand of grass.

2.

On behalf of the City of Fort Worth (COFW), Doug Rademaker, P.E. (COFW, TRV Bridges Project Manager) showed the Board photographs of the V-piers on White Settlement Road. He noted that steel inspection is underway on White Settlement 4R. He also noted the forms for the V-piers will be reused. He showed the Board a video of the removal of the White Settlement Bridge false work. Mr. Rademaker reported that White Settlement 3L V-pier was

poured August 29, 2017. He also reported that TxDOT and the contractors have agreed to conduct the concrete testing together. Mr. Rademaker noted that the next V-pier to be poured will be White Settlement 4R on September 28, 2017. He advised the Board that the Teague Lumber driveway will be moved and access to the frontage roads will be available in October. Mr. Rademaker also noted that progress continues along Henderson Street. Next, he reported to the Board that the North Main Street traffic switches at 7th Street and 11th Street are in place. He also noted that pavement is being removed and soil borings are underway on North Main Street. Finally, Mr. Rademaker noted that the White Settlement Road Bridge should be open in 2019 and the Main Street Bridge should be open in mid-2020.

D3.

Update on TRV-Gateway Park Master Plan

Ms. Gail Hicks, (USACE) provided an update on the TRV Gateway Park Master Plan. She reported that bypass channel 60% design is under review. Ms. Hicks also reported that the Oxbow Phase 2 comments period closed out. Lastly, she reported that Riverside Park is in vegetation.

D4.

The next TRVA Board of Directors next meeting is scheduled for October 4, 2017 at 2:00 p.m.

V. Executive Session

President Maenius next called an executive session at 3:10 P.M. under Section 551.072 of the Texas Government Code to deliberate the purchase or value of real property and under Section 551.071 of the Texas Government Code to conduct a private consultation with attorneys regarding pending or contemplated litigation and to consult with legal counsel on a matter in which the duty of counsel under the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct clearly conflicts with

Chapter 551, Texas Government Code. The executive session concluded, and President Maenius reconvened the regular session at 3:26 P.M., noting that a quorum was present.
